

PASTOR'S PAGE

I probably should begin where I left off in the December Templetones, where I ended by saying that this Advent:

"I choose to embrace the unexpected, the unplanned, the unchosen, the unwanted, the inconvenient, the disappointment, and the loss, and look for the signs of God's presence and faithfulness as he promises to lead and direct my steps ... every step of the way.

This Advent – I choose to be encouraged by the opportunity to be faithful in return – creative, obedient, and Spirit-led opportunistic – willing to adapt, adjust, and love the lesser expressions of the things we miss ... things that we can't do in exactly the same way, but things that are holy and precious nonetheless because they have God as our object of worship and of sacrifice."

Disappointments were many, to be sure, and embraced without whining (well, mostly), but Advent was still Advent with many of the signs, symbols, and rituals transplanted to the parking lot, and the clear, cold, night air on Christmas Eve added a different kind of beauty and reverence to celebrating the birth of the Christ child. Our tent arrived, was put up, and launched over the course of the last days of Advent through Epiphany, which has had a positive impact on our worship times, most noticeably in our singing. One personal, unexpected joy was our daughter's extended 4-week stay with us, made possible by Covid-related circumstances in San Diego.

Most of all, though, Advent was a coming to terms with the loss of what I imagined my last year with you all to be. I was looking forward to one more walk through the Church year, marking our way with many of the things we do together that are special and dear to us, not the least being our weekly worship times in our sanctuary.

I think many, if not most of us, initially anticipated that life would have returned to some semblance of normalcy by now, including the things we value in our congregational life. That hasn't happened, and will likely not happen until the summer, at the earliest. So for me, probably the most significant aspect of Advent for me was that it allowed (forced?) me to let go of the 'temporariness' of the pandemic, embrace what 'is', and stop looking forward to finishing in a manner that replicates what 'was.' As such, it was both a final, painful loss, *and* a renewed freedom to love and be more present in the 'now' of what is. For that I am grateful, and look forward with a fresh expectancy to whatever the next six months will be.

This quality to "be more present in the 'now'" was just this past weekend reinforced for me by Pete Scazzero, one of the speakers at the ECO National Gathering. He was the pastor I referred to in my sermon last Sunday who had become so consumed by the 'doing' of ministry – so drained by demands of program, activity, business, planning, leading, organizing, etc., etc. – that he basically burned himself up and had to step outside of ministry in order to heal and find himself anew as a *person* and not a *pastor*. Which, as I also referenced on Sunday, is not that uncommon for those of us in full-time ministry. I know that tension well. I was struck with his emphasis on "being vs. doing" – that we must first "be" in order to "do." We can only give what we have – out of *who we are* – and when our *doing* happens at the expense of our *being* – we soon have little left to give. I know that for myself, keeping those two things in balance operates like an internal thermostat – I have to keep correcting myself from becoming imbalanced in either extreme (mostly having to correct the over-doing).

So, Scazzero's talk was reminiscent of last year's opening night speaker, Ruth Haley Barton, who made a significant impression on me, as she taught and shared personally in a very similar vein. I picked up three of her books, and was prompted this weekend to start reading the one titled, SACRED RHYTHMS – Arranging our Lives for Spiritual Transformation. It's very much about living in a non-striving approach in our path to growing into the person that God sees and wants us to be. Too often we act as if we are responsible for our transformation, when in fact, we are not. In her introduction, Barton writes what she called 'the most hopeful thing any of us can say about spiritual transformation: I cannot transform myself, or anyone else for that matter. What I can do is create the conditions in which spiritual transformation can take place..." Another way of saying we must be someone in order to do something.

So – where is all this going? An invitation to engage with me, during Lent, this idea, this task, of 'being' in our longing for God and to be present to his work of transformation.

The Pastor's Lenten Project

One of the things that we, as a session, staff, and deacons are trying to address is the lack of interpersonal connectedness that the pandemic and its accompanying restrictions have inflicted upon us. Deprived of our being able to be together in any comprehensive, consistent way eats away at the fabric of our fellowship, gnawing at the relational threads we previously took for granted – the blessed 'ties that bind' as the old hymn goes.

I'd like to take a stab at repairing some of those threads. I haven't thought through all the pieces yet, but here's what I have so far:

Invitation to read with me Ruth Haley Barton's book, *Sacred Rhythms*. It has 9 chapters, 7 of which introduce a spiritual practice and the invitation to consider it and practice it. The idea is to read a chapter a week and do the suggested practices, and not rush, which means it will be something that will take us past Easter before we're done. You don't have to read the book to participate in any of the other opportunities below.

Attend, in person or online, our Ash Wednesday service on February 17. We may have a second service either earlier or later, depending on the need. We'll get the specifics out next week.

Receive a daily email from me. Again, the specifics of what that will entail are still forming, but as of now I plan to share something to help start your day — a thought, a prayer, a quote, or ???. Lent, being a time of preparing for finishing of Christ's work — his death and resurrection — and all that it means for our salvation and transformation, don't be surprised if you see a prayer of confession more often than not. Also, I would like the email to be a forum for those who are reading and working through the book Sacred Rhythms, to share our own thoughts and reflections on what we are reading and how we are experiencing it. If the church doesn't have your email address, and you'd like to be included, be sure to get it to Julie.

Attend, in person or online, our Maundy Thursday service on April 1. I doubt we'll be able to have our usual bread and soup supper, but we'll gather in the parking lot and have whatever other aspects of the service that will be doable under the tent.

Attend, in person or online, our Easter service on Sunday, April 4.

On-going Stephen Ministry work:



ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP



Templeton Presbyterian Church Academic Scholarships



Session and covenant partners in our congregation have helped create a supportive ministry for graduating high school, community college and graduate students – TPC Academic Scholarships – to encourage and support students attending four-year accredited colleges/universities or graduate schools, whose life accomplishments have demonstrated their commitment to Jesus Christ as reflected in the stated mission of our church (below).

If you would like to add to the TPC Academic Scholarship Fund, please designate your contribution on the subject line of your check. It will be very gratefully received!

Presbyterians have a history of placing a high value on higher education, and have been instrumental through the ages in establishing colleges, universities and seminaries. As the hostility to church and faith in general continues to grow in academia, and the culture at large, it becomes even more imperative for the church to lift up a generation of students who can give an intelligent, vibrant witness for Christ during their years of higher education study.

We have 3-5 graduating high school and community college students this year who may be eligible for a TPC Academic Scholarship! We want to tangibly show our students our support – let them know we have their back as they embark on this new, sometimes daunting, college adventure. We also want to underscore our support for their families, some of whom are not eligible for significant government programs to help offset the increasingly high cost of a college education.

The TPC Academic Scholarship/s will be awarded based upon student commitment to the TPC Mission Statement; merit and/or financial need will also be considered. Applicants must be TPC covenant partners, children of covenant partners, students active in TPC's youth group, or students active in TPC's ministries. The number and amount of awards are variable. Renewal applications will be considered. Scholarship checks will be distributed upon proof of college/university registration.

To the application, attach the following:

- Essay (1 typewritten page): demonstrate how you have lived, and will live, a life consistent with the TPC Mission Statement.
- Two letters of recommendation: one that addresses academic accomplishments and one that addresses character
- Transcript: an unofficial copy of your transcript
- Copy (if available) of your FAFSA confirmation page indicating your Expected Family Contribution (EFC)
- April 23, 2021 is the deadline for receipt of application submissions by the church office.
